Rising Up to the Combat Challenge

Being a firefighter takes more than just hard work and training. It is a physically demanding job that requires you to be at your very best.

To the six firefighters who make up the Toronto Pearson Airport Combat Challenge Team, they not only respect this, it is the reason behind their dedication to a sport that also demands nothing but the best.

Hailed by ESPN as the toughest two minutes in sports, firefighters compete in the Combat Challenge wearing full bunker gear and a Scott Air-Pack. They race head-tohead on a linked series of five grueling firefightingrelated tasks. The event tasks, which include a five floor stair climb carrying approximately

42 pounds of hose and the dragging of a 175 pound 'victim' 100 feet, are timed and completed sequentially.

"The Combat Challenge is a great way to stay in shape for the demands seen on the job every day," says GTAA Firefighter Jason Lavery, noting a high level of physical fitness can be hard to maintain over a 25 year career. "The season is six months long, but the training is a full year commitment."

The GTAA team first tried their hand at the challenge three years ago. Considering it was their

Still, inspired by the competition seen at the national level, the team began their second season with an enhanced motivation, some equipment and gear, and a team intensity that grew with each event. Average race times dropped below two minutes, and the Pearson Airport team began gaining a reputation as a serious competitor. Now, into their third season, Lavery hails this year's competitions "a great

success."

"Pearson Airport won the team event in Belleville, placed third overall in Windsor, and were first in the region for the relay event in

Brampton," says Lavery, noting just a few of the team and individual accomplishments from the 2005 year.

The group recently returned from the National Championships in Edmonton Alberta,

with high hopes and weren't disappointed," says Lavery.

Both the national and the regional competitions, Lavery continues, serve a dual purpose. The first, of course, is to compete, with the second involving the opportunity to bring together firefighters from around the country.

"The people you meet at each event are great. Everyone is very supportive of each other and willing to share the latest techniques and training practices," says Lavery. "Just after the Air France emergency, the team competed to a standing ovation when their names and team were announced."

He adds that GTAA Fire and Emergency Services, which is a relatively small fire department, have gained national exposure in the industry thanks to the competitions. "Pearson Combat is strongly recognized as a combat team. Our intense training is paying off with good results and very competitive events."

The team will compete in one more event this year when they travel to the World Championships in Deerfield Beach, Florida the beginning of

first year in competition, the team did remarkably well, with the average race time between two and two and a half minutes. Still, Lavery admits it was a rude awakening to fully understand the physical intensity of the sport.

"The first year was about getting our feet wet in a sense," says Lavery. "We had seen and heard about the Combat Challenge, but were naïve about the level of commitment which was required. We had no specialized training equipment, and were not in good enough shape to handle a full season of events."

competing against the best that Canada had to offer. Building on the momentum of the season, the team did the GTAA and Toronto Pearson proud, placing 8th in the country in the relay event, and 19th in the team event.
